1. Overview of Operating Results

(1) Overview of Operating Results for the Current Period

In the first six months of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026, the global economy performed well despite uncertainties in U.S. trade policies and the impact of geopolitical risks. Despite the partial impact of factors such as U.S. trade policies, the Japanese economy maintained a moderate recovery trend, supported by wage increases and capital investment. Amid these circumstances, consolidated net sales of the Kyoei Steel Group in the first six months of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026, decreased by 6,353 million yen (3.9%) year on year to 154,683 million yen, consolidated operating profit increased by 3,293 million yen (55.7%) year on year to 9,208 million yen, consolidated ordinary profit increased by 2,347 million yen (38.3%) year on year to 8,482 million yen, and profit attributable to owners of parent increased by 367 million yen (7.3%) year on year to 5,433 million yen.

Results by business segment are as follows.

1) Domestic Steel Business

Domestic demand for steel products remained sluggish due to labor shortages at construction and distribution sites, delays and lengthening of construction periods caused by extreme temperatures in the summer, and scattered revisions of plans in response to rising material prices and other factors. In this environment, product shipments in the first six months of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026 decreased by 35,000 tons year on year to 690,000 tons. While the price of steel scrap, a raw material, remained weak and the price per ton fell 9,200 yen (17.8%) year on year, we managed to limit the decrease in product sales prices by 8,100 yen (7.8%) year on year through ensuring production and sales were in line with demand, thereby increasing the sales margin (the difference between the sales price of the product and the purchase price of raw materials) by 1,000 yen (2.0%) year on year.

However, due to decreases in production volume and shipments, net sales fell 9,157 million yen (12.6%) year on year to 63,745 million yen, and operating profit declined 975 million yen (12.4%) year on year to 6,897 million yen.

2) Overseas Steel Business

Kyoei Steel operates steel businesses in Vietnam and North America (the United States and Canada), both of which have a fiscal year-end of December 31.

In Vietnam, demand for steel recovered driven by government-led infrastructure investment, and product shipments at all bases increased from the same period of the previous fiscal year. Although the competitive environment remained severe, increased shipments and cost reductions helped our operations in Vietnam to post an operating profit at all bases.

In North America, the business environment was favorable in both the U.S. and Canada. Although it is taking time to resolve operational issues at the U.S. base due to aging facilities, the operating deficit narrowed by approximately 40% year on year. The Canadian base performed well under firm construction demand. The impact of U.S. tariff policies was limited.

As a result, segment net sales increased by 3,440 million yen (4.2%) year on year to 85,755 million yen, and operating profit increased by 4,192 million yen (compared with an operating loss of 1,590 million yen in the same period of the previous fiscal year) to 2,601 million yen.

3) Material Recycling Business

For this business segment, net sales decreased by 432 million yen (13.6%) year on year to 2,750 million yen and operating profit decreased by 283 million yen (79.3%) year on year to 74 million yen due to continued fierce competition in the medical waste treatment business and higher costs stemming from lower treatment volumes.

4) Others

This category includes harbor operations in Vietnam and the casting business in Japan and Vietnam. Segment net sales decreased by 204 million yen (7.7%) year on year to 2,432 million yen and operating profit increased by 83 million yen (40.6%) year on year to 288 million yen.

(2) Overview of Financial Position for the Current Period

Assets

Current assets decreased by 12,498 million yen, or 5.9%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 198,798 million yen. This was attributable mainly to increases of 8,000 million yen in securities, 1,730 million yen in raw materials and supplies, and 1,142 million yen in other under current assets, and decreases of 14,473 million yen in cash and deposits, 3,444 million yen in accounts receivable - trade, and 4,726 million yen in merchandise and finished goods.

Non-current assets decreased by 1,976 million yen, or 1.4%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 139,555 million yen. This was attributable mainly to decreases of 963 million yen in buildings and structures, 1,705 million yen in machinery, equipment and vehicles, and 472 million yen in deferred tax assets, despite an increase of 1,631 million yen in other, net under property, plant and equipment and 354 million yen in investment securities.

As a result, total assets decreased by 14,474 million yen, or 4.1%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 338,354 million yen.

Liabilities

Current liabilities decreased by 990 million yen, or 1.0%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 102,269 million yen. This was attributable mainly to increases of 2,336 million yen in notes and accounts payable - trade, 1,477 million yen in electronically recorded obligations - operating, and 10,000 million yen in current portion of bonds payable, and decreases of 10,009 million yen in short-term borrowings, 723 million yen in income taxes payable, and 4,511 million yen in other under current liabilities.

Non-current liabilities decreased by 13,403 million yen, or 33.2%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 27,009 million yen. This was attributable mainly to decreases of 10,000 million yen in bonds payable, 2,898 million yen in long-term borrowings, and 218 million yen in deferred tax liabilities.

As a result, total liabilities decreased by 14,393 million yen, or 10.0%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 129,278 million yen.

Net assets

Net assets decreased by 81 million yen, or 0.0%, from the end of the previous fiscal year to 209,076 million yen. This was attributable mainly to the recording of profit attributable to owners of parent of 5,433 million yen, an increase of 225 million yen in valuation difference on available-for-sale securities, and decreases of 2,745 million yen in foreign currency translation adjustment, 180 million yen in non-controlling interests, and 2,608 million yen due to dividends of retained earnings.

As a result, equity-to-asset ratio increased from 57.5% at the end of the previous fiscal year to 60.0%.

Cash flows

Cash and cash equivalents at the end of the first half of the current fiscal year decreased by 4,298 million yen from the end of the previous fiscal year to 33,754 million yen. The cash flow components during the first half of the current fiscal year and the main reasons for changes are as follows.

(i) Cash flows from operating activities

Net cash provided by operating activities was 14,132 million yen. Major components included profit before income taxes of 8,382 million yen, depreciation of 3,794 million yen, a decrease of 2,027 million yen in trade receivables, an increase of 4,718 million yen in trade payables, interest and dividends received of 763 million yen, interest paid of 1,244 million yen, and income taxes paid of 3,293 million yen.

(ii) Cash flows from investing activities

Net cash used in investing activities was 7,495 million yen. Major components included payments into time deposits and other of 9,828 million yen, proceeds from withdrawal of time deposits and other of 15,620 million yen, purchase of securities of 4,000 million yen and purchase of property, plant and equipment of 9,031 million yen.

(iii) Cash flows from financing activities

Net cash used in financing activities was 10,757 million yen. Major components included a net decrease of 5,384 million yen in short-term borrowings, repayments of long-term borrowings of 2,527 million yen, and dividends paid of 2,607 million yen.

(3) Explanation of Consolidated Forecasts and Other Forward-looking Statements

For the domestic steel business in and after the third quarter of the current fiscal year (second half), demand for steel construction materials is expected to remain weak due to delays and revisions in construction work caused by labor shortages and soaring material prices. In addition, steel scrap prices are on an upward trend and are expected to remain higher than previously assumed, resulting in a slightly lower-than-planned forecast due to a narrowing of the sales margin.

On the other hand, the performance for the overseas steel business is expected to be higher than planned. In Vietnam, shipments are expected to increase as the new rolling line, which began full-scale operations at the northern base, is smoothly ramping up amid continued strong demand for steel products. The southern base is expected to secure shipment volume by acquiring project orders, on which it has been focusing instead of residential demand, which has been slow to recover, and by exporting products to neighboring countries. In North America, the U.S. base will strive for stable operations to capture current demand and aim to return to profitability in the second half of the fiscal year. Although there is a slight delay in progress at the Canadian base due to equipment trouble, solid performance is expected.

In the material recycling business, we expect conditions to remain difficult as in the first half of the fiscal year, and we will work to increase the number of projects for difficult-to-treat waste with high treatment unit prices and CFC gases, aiming for a recovery in business performance.

Based on the above, the full-year forecast remains unchanged from that announced in the "Consolidated Financial Results for the First Quarter of the Fiscal Year Ending March 31, 2026" on July 31, 2025. The dividend forecast remains unchanged.

*1 Industrial Revenue Bond (IRB)

An IRB is a tax-exempt bond issued by a local government to support private sector capital investment. Interest income received by bondholders is exempt from taxation, resulting in lower interest rates. This enables companies utilizing IRBs to raise funds at a lower cost.

Vinton Steel LLC has entered into a borrowing agreement with Mission Economic Development Corporation, Mission, Texas, to execute a loan in an amount equal to the IRB. For the issuance of the IRBs, the Company has received a letter of credit from Sumitomo Mitsui Banking Corporation, which has a high credit rating in the U.S., and the Company has provided a guarantee for the letter of credit.
